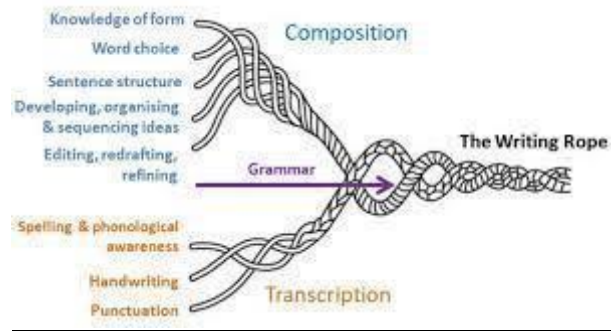


Stannington Infant School Curriculum for the Teaching of Transcriptional and Compositional Skills Year 2 2024-25
